Three ways to obtain marijuana in Uruguay

- Home cultivation (autocultivo)
- Sale through pharmacies
- Cannabis Clubs

Cannabis Clubs

Cannabis Clubs

- 15 to 45 members part of civil association
- Association must register before authorities
- Association is responsible for registering members before authorities
- Allowed to cultivate up to 99 plants
- Annual crop of 480 grams per person
- Preferred legal method of access to marijuana for only 12.8% of high frequency consumers

Cannabis Clubs Study

Our study

- Legal background
- Profile of Cannabis Clubs
 - On site, face to face interviews with Clubs representatives
- Profile of Cannabis Clubs members
 - Self-administered online survey
- Study of Marijuana provided by Clubs
 - Gas and liquid chromatography / THC CBD levels

Regulations for Clubs

Two steps:

- Register with the Ministry of Education and Culture as a non-profit organization
- Register with IRCCA (Cannabis Control and Regulation Institute)
 - Registration with the Office of Uruguayan Post Service (form designed by IRCCA)
 - Documents to be presented to IRCCA
 - IRCCA inspection

Documents to be presented to IRCCA

- Notarized bylaws, duly approved and authorized by the Ministry of Education and Culture
- Notarized copy of the minutes listing all personal data of the founding members of the Club. The date of birth of each founding member must be provided.
- Proof of address or utility bill on behalf of the nonprofit organization
- Documents certifying ownership, lease, possession or any other title by which the non-profit organization is authorized to be headquartered at the property where the crop is to be grown.
- Crop Plan describing the technical and security details of the plantation development
- A plan for cannabis distribution to club members

Registration with IRCCA: Inspection

Club's operations:

1) days and times of activity must be stated

3) any activity out of the time set for activities is prohibited, except for maintenance and cleaning

4) advertising, promotion and sponsorship on facades is prohibited

5) crop plan and delivery system are requested reports6) the club must respect a minimum distance of 150 meters to education centers for students under 18 and/or addiction treatment centers.

Infrastructure:


1) space exclusively devoted to cultivation, and outside signs identifying the club are prohibited

2) security is an important issue in the regulation

Registration with IRCCA

16 clubs have already started the process

IRCCA inspection (just one)

 - Affordable
 - Readily available (at some point)
- Activism
 - Raise awareness
 - Spread knowledge

Challenges and problems

- Compliance with the regulation
 - Little guidance from authorities
 - Uncertainty about what is to come

Financial sustainability

- ✤ Member dues
- Security is a burden

Little knowledge in society

- Neighbors filling claims before Police
- Police protocol unclear
- Collective action dilemmas
 - "Reality tops fiction... and ideology!"

Final Remarks

- Difficult implementation
 - ✤Delays
 - Lack of guidance from authorities
 - ✤ Gaps in the regulation
- ✤ A sustainable model?
 - Idealistic views of collective action in harsh contrast with reality
 - Restrictions in current regulation make it even more difficult
