



Washington's marijuana laws disproportionately impact African Americans.

African Americans are more likely to be arrested in Washington for marijuana possession and sales than white people, despite using at equal rates.

 An African American adult is roughly 3 times more likely to be arrested for marijuana possession or sales in Washington than a white adult.¹





 Drug usage rates do not explain why African Americans receive disparate law enforcement treatment.

In Washington, **41.8%** of African American adults have used marijuana, and **42.8%** of white adults have done so.²
